Economic Impacts

Negative impacts: Unequal distribution of wealth and intensified competition.

Social movements advocating for human rights and gender equality.

Positive impacts: Cultural exchange and improvements in education and public health.

Negative impacts: Loss of cultural identity and increasing social inequality.

Increased political participation among citizens as a result of greater access to information from various media sources, leading to the emergence of new ideas.

Positive impacts: International cooperation and the promotion of human rights.

Negative impacts: A reduced role of the nation-state and increased political conflict.

Positive impacts: Development of environmental technologies and international cooperation in addressing environmental issues.

Negative impacts: Increased pollution and environmental degradation.
